



DR. BARBARA A. SIZEMORE

Professor, Department of Black Community Education, Research and Development University of Pittsburgh

Are knowned educator, consultant, author and lecturer, Dr. Sizemore is a recipient of numerous awards and honors for her contributions to education and social justice. Her honors include the United Nations Association of Human Rights Awards, Who's Who Among Black Americans, and World's Who's Who of Women.

Dr. Sizemore is a former public school principal, superintendent, city council member, and department chairperson. She is a full professor who is on the educational board of several journals and the author of twenty-two articles, chapters in twenty-three books and numerous other publications.



EDMUND W. GORDON

Dr. Edmund W. Gordon is a member of the permanent faculty at Yale University where he holds a primary appointment as the John M. Musser Professor of Psychology and secondary appointments as Professor at the Program in African and African-American Studies, and as Professor, Institution of Social and Policy Studies, and Professor of Child Psychology, Child Study Center, Yale University School of Medicine. Professor Gordon received his Bachelor of Science degree in Zoology at Howard University. He also earned the Bachelor of Divinity degree in Social Ethics from Howard's Graduate School of Divinity. He earned the Master of Arts degree in Social Psychology from the American University and the Doctor of Education degree in Child Development and Guidance from Teachers College, Columbia University.



Professor Gordon's distinguished career spans professional practice, scholarly life as a minister, clinical and counseling psychologist, research scientist, author, editor, and professor.

He has held appointments at several of the nation's leading universities including Howard, Yeshiva, Harvard, Columbia, the Educational Testing Service, CCNY and Yale.

Dr. Gordon's scholarship is documented in his authorship of more than 100 articles in scholarly journals and book chapters, and in 10 books and monographs authored or edited by him.

DR. ASA G. HILLIARD, III

Professor of Urban Education Georgia State University

Dr. Hilliard, an educational psychologist and historian, holds concurrent appointments in the Departments of Educational Foundations, Early Childhood Education, and Counseling and Psychological Services at Georgia State University. A specialist on African and African-American history and culture, the study of implications for cross-cultural validity in the use of psychological testing for African-Americans and valid teaching methods. Dr. Hilliard has served as a consultant to national, state and local legislative and other policy-making bodies. He has also been a consultant and trainer on validity and equity in curriculum, assessment and teaching methods.



Aformer public school teacher, school psychologist, school superintendent, and department chair, Dr. Hilliard is currently a researcher, lecturer and author who has received many awards and honors for his contributions. He has studied and worked in Africa, Europe, South America, the Caribbean and the Pacific Islands.

DR. ISAURA SANTIAGO SANTIAGO

President, Hostos Community College New York, New York

Anationally known leader in Bilingual, Bicultural Education, research and teacher training. She has served as Associate Professor of Languages and Program Head in Bilingual Education at Teacher's Colege, taught at Fordham University and served as Deputy Executive Director of Aspira of New York, Inc.

Dr. Santiago Santiago has authored many articles and books on bilingualism and bilingualeducation. Her primary research has been on equity issues affecting Latinos and on language polices affecting ethnolinguistic minorities. One of her publications is an extensive bibliography entitled "Minority Women in Teaching, Administration, and Leadership." Dr. Santiago Santiago has held many elected and appointed positions in such prestigious organizations as the NYC Board of Education, Bilingual Education Commission, Board of Directors of Puerto Rico Legal Defense and Education Fund, American Council of Education's International Educational Commission and the Editorial Board of the American Journal of Education.



DR. HAROLD L. HODGKINSON

Director, Center for Demographic Policy, Institute for Educational Leadership Washington, D.C.

A well-known consultant, editor, lecturer, and analyst of educational issues, Dr. Hodgkinson has directed eight major research projects for the Carnegie Commission, U.S. Office of Education, Ford Foundation and the Atlantic Richfield Foundation.

Dr. Hodgkinson is currently conducting research on demographics and education for the Center for Demographic Policy. He also serves as Senior Advisor to the American Council on Education. The author of twelve books, three of which have won national awards and over 200 articles. Dr. Hodgkinson has also served as editor for several journals, including the <u>Harvard Educational Review</u> and the <u>Journal of Higher Education</u>.



THERMAN E. EVANS, M.D.

Vice President and Corporate Medical Director, Cigma Corporation Philadelphia, Pennsylvania

Dr. Evans has had extensive involvement in health promotion, health education and health policy development. He has served on numerous committees, commissions and advisory boards including the federal government's departmentsof Health and Human Services and Urban Development. Currently serving as Chaiperson of the Mayor's City Wide Commission on the prevention of teenage pregnancy in Philadelphia. He has also served as President of the Washington, D.C. Board of Education.

Dr. Evans has been published extensively in such journals, magazines and newspapers as the Journal of American Medical Association, the New England Journal of Medicine. Nutrition Today, Ebony and The Black Collegian. In addition, he has lectured extensively and has appeared on numerous national and local radio and television health oriented programs.



ARNOLD MITCHEM

Arnold Mitchem is the Executive Director, National Council of Educational Opportunity Associations where he is responsible to the Board of Directors for all aspects of the management and coordination of activities of a national association representing administrators, counselors, and teachers involved with low-income, minority and other disadvantaged students in educational opportunity programs.

Dr. Mitchem has previous experience as an Education Opportunity Program Director and Afro-American history instructor.

Dr. Mitchem earned his Doctor of Philosophy degree in the History and Philosophy of Education from Marquette University. He has provided testimony to the United States Congress on special programs for disadvantged students on several occasions; published articles on Educational Opportunity Programs, financial aid, the inequalities in the educational experience of Black and White Americans and many other topics; and serves on the University of Maine's Commission on Pluralism, among numerous other professional activities.


As Governor, I am pleased to send my warm regards to the participants of the Tri-State Consortium gathered for your conference on opportunity programs in higher education.

Dear Colleagues:

On behalf of the higher education community in the State of New Jersey, it gives me great pleasure to welcome you to the Tri-State Consortium of Opportunity Programs Conference. I am especially pleased that the leadership of the opportunity programs in the tri-state region are using this conference to discuss issues critical to the successful participation of minorities in higher education.

In New Jersey, EOF has been in the forefront of initiatives to address the access and retention of African-American, Hispanic and other underrepresented student populations in higher education. Over 20, 000 graduates, a very high retention rate, and over 200 seniors who graduate annually with honors, has convinced us that our program works. We must be proud of this news and share it. Dear Colleagues and Friends:

I am very pleased to welcome you to the Tri-State Consortium of Opportunity Programs and the State of New Jersey. We hope to join with our colleagues from the states of New Jersey, New York and Pennsylvania to reflect on our past accomplishments, and learn new methods to ensure our future success, as reflected in our very appropriate conference theme "A Mirror on the Past-A Window to the Future".

This conference hosts many individuals from institutions and programs across the tri-state area who share the same goals: to advocate and implement comprehensive programs to increase minority involvement in higher education. Educational opportunity programs are successful as measured by our graduates, who are making significant contributions to the nation's economy in medicine, law, government, education, engineering and many other professions.

We know that our path to success has not been without a struggle. The initial focus of opportunity programs in the late 1960's and 1970's was one of access to higher education. The decline in African-American enrollment in the 1980's dictated that the emphasis on access had to be broadened to also include issues of retention and graduation rates, institutional climate, representation of African-American and Hispanic faculty and staff, diversity and multi-culturalism. In addition, opportunity program staff have had to serve as motivators, role models, advocates and "in locus parentis" to ensure that our student population received all of the benefits, rights and privileges that majority students receive as part of the process of higher education.

Since the inception of opportunity programs, the attention and energies of the staff have concentrated on our student population, to the degree that we have not consistently acknowledged our successes. We need to inform legislators, the higher education community and the general public that their investment in educational opportunity programs is a sound, wise and healthy choice for the economy of the nation.

As educators, it is imperative that we dedicate ourselves to securing the necessary credentials; conducting and disseminating the research essential to document effective practices; establishing the body of knowledge germane to our efforts; and mobilizing the political coalitions which will help sustain our efforts. I am sure that the Tri-State Consortium of Opportunity Programs conference will be one vehicle that we can utilize to acquire the scientific and research knowledge needed to make research an integral part of our program activities.

In addition, we must expand our focus from that of helping students "change" to adapt to sometimes hostile institutional climates, to a broader emphasis of institutional change one of developing teaching/leaming environments that will promote excellence for our students. We must be on the "cutting edge" of change, so that our students, wherever they choose to attend college will be successful because of supportive institutional environments and not in spite of the barriers they may be forced to endure.

This will only come as a result of dedication on our part. We must be willing to take the steps necessary to prepare ourselves as educators and administrators to develop a body of knowledge using our voices and experiences, and to remain politically active and involved.
