This interactive session will cover how the EOF Program at Rutgers University – Newark uses an annual strategic planning model to break down barriers and motivate team members towards collective goals. Self-improvement and self-care always begin with self-awareness and the ability to embrace the decision that some things may need to change. In this workshop there will be a brief self-assessment of strengths and challenges. We will define and identify the usage of emotional masks that have replaced our true self. We will identify steps toward self-care in the unique definition of self-worth and its application. Finally, we will learn to celebrate small victories toward self-care and that we are worth the investment.

Best Practices For Student Retention And Success In Higher Education.

Abstract: My presentation on "Best Practices for Student Success and Retention in Higher Education" will highlight factors that have enabled me to build a successful record as a higher education professional with over 20 years of experience, at community colleges, and four-year universities. Thus, I will present real-world data, based on real-world outcomes. Such successes have included effective marketing, recruitment, and enrollment practices that increased yields for all student populations served, from various regions throughout New York State, including those from low-income backgrounds, who are first-generation college students. Additionally, I have had success within student support services. I will point to best practices for reducing attrition rates for at-risk students from racial and ethnically diverse populations who are underrepresented in higher education. My presentation will outline strategies to increase the retention, persistence, and graduation rates for such students from vulnerable populations.

The Comeback Summer: The Story Of Redesigning EOP Success At SUNY Morrisville

Abstract: When significant staff turnover and program turmoil challenged the EOP Summer Academy at SUNY Morrisville, we saw an opportunity to rebuild—not just the program, but the community. By redesigning the Academy to emphasize academic support, social integration, and peer mentorship (plus a lot of fun), we created a dynamic, student-centered experience. The results? A thriving sense of community, a 9.4% increase in retention over two years, and rising GPAs across the board. This session will highlight how strategic redesign can drive student success, transform program outcomes, and prove that even small changes can have big, measurable impacts.

The Ph.D. And You!

Abstract: "EOF is the Cheat Code" is an engaging workshop that showcases how the EOF program serves as a powerful tool for student success. Dr. Wright, a dynamic storyteller and former EOF scholar, leads the workshop and draws from his dissertation to explore five factors that produce high-achieving students. Professionals will learn how these factors support mental health, resiliency, individual growth, self-care, and self-esteem to help scholars overcome adversity. By focusing on personal growth and leadership, it will improve student retention, build self-confidence, and increase graduation rates. This will enhance resiliency, empowering students to thrive academically and achieve long-term success.

Bridging The Gap: The First-Gen Student Center At Ramapo College

Abstract: Ramapo College launched a First-Generation Student Center to create a supportive campus environment for students who are first in their families to graduate with a 4 year degree in the US. The Center builds off the success of Ramapo's established EOF program. This presentation will explore the key strategies used in establishing the Center, covering its history and stakeholder engagement since 2018, current initiatives centered on student programming and feedback, and the overarching vision for the Center's future. Additionally, the session will discuss the importance of institutional commitment, cross-campus collaboration, and a campus culture that celebrates first-generation student success.

Building Recruitment And Retention Plans For First-Generation Students

Abstract: Ramapo College will share the holistic and collaborative strategies implemented to scale and tailor first-generation student recruitment and retention. Over the last four years, Ramapo has doubled the number of first-generation students and increased their retention rate to match the overall excellent College rate of 87%. Using a Strategic Enrollment Management approach, Admissions, Financial Aid, Student Success (including EOF and the First-Generation Student Center) and Advancement have collaborated to reallocate funds, shift financial aid strategy, increase student support and receive external funding to build a culture of first-generation success.

Building Academic Resilience: Practical Strategies For Coaching In Opportunity Programs

Abstract: This presentation explores the transformative role of academic coaching in advancing opportunity programs by enhancing metacognitive mastery and promoting self-regulated learning. By applying theoretical frameworks such as Bandura's Social Cognitive Theory, Triadic Reciprocal Determinism, and Vygotsky's Zone of Proximal Development, the session demonstrates how coaching fosters self-awareness, learning autonomy, and academic success. Participants will learn practical strategies for integrating academic coaching into advising, mentoring, and tutoring, with an emphasis on improving student access, persistence, and retention. Real-world examples and research outcomes will showcase the effectiveness of academic coaching in supporting students in opportunity programs.

Nurturing Curiosity - Piloting An Emerging Researchers Program For CSTEP Students

Abstract: The Emerging Researchers Program is a multi-year pilot program designed to cultivate the career aspirations of future scientists and researchers. We had 10 first- and second-year students, and we will triple that number next year. The first year, "Decoding STEM Research", introduced students to research methods and built their critical thinking skills through a Journal Club led by senior students on similar career journeys. Our central goal was to foster critical thinking, enhance research literacy, and promote interdisciplinary discussions among STEM students through exposure to diverse research. This workshop will discuss how to foster researcher identities to improve career outcomes.

Where Are Your Students Playing? The Gamification Of Counseling And How To Recognize Your Students' Needs Through The Lens Of Online Gaming

Abstract: This presentation explores the intersection of online gaming and student well-being, highlighting how gamification influences counseling practices in higher education. Attendees will learn to recognize key behaviors and challenges faced by students in online gaming environments and how these experiences impact academic performance and mental health. Leveraging Technology For Seamless Recruitment And Enrollment At Westchester EOC

Abstract: Streamlining the enrollment journey for applicants is crucial to the success of Westchester EOC, where efficient processes and personal connections guide applicants from recruitment through orientation. This workshop will present our approach to using scheduling tools like Acuity Scheduling to manage and enhance each step of the enrollment pipeline. By tracking every interaction—from initial outreach and admissions testing to enrollment interviews, document submissions, and orientation scheduling—we ensure a responsive and supportive applicant experience.
